

INFORMED CONSENT FOR DENTAL TREATMENT

X-RAYS	FILLINGS
BENEFITS:	BENEFITS:
More complete diagnosis	Eliminate decay
Can find hidden problems	Relieve pain
Can make a determination of treatment	Fill in a hole or space in a tooth
X-Rays are taken by qualified personnel	Cover eroded area
POSSIBLE COMPLICATIONS:	Protect a sensitive surface
Exposure to X-Ray radiation (minimal)	POSSIBLE COMPLICATIONS:
X-Ray pictures remain the property of this office	Tooth may abscess from the filing
CONSEQUENCES OF NOT HAVING WORK DONE OF POSTPONING	May fracture the tooth
Cannot perform dental services	Tooth will be sensitive to temperature change
ALTERNATIVES:	Toxicity from silver fillings is alleged by some
None	Filling may fallout
	May result in need for a root canal
CLEANING – SCALING	CONSEQUENCES OF NOT HAVING WORK DONE or POSTPONING:
BENEFITS:	May lose the tooth
Look nicer	Tooth may fracture
Clean mouth	Decay will get worse
Eliminate odors	May result in need for a root canal
Prevent odors	ALTERNATIVES:
Prevents Gum Disease	Temporary filling
Some portions may be performed by auxiliary personnel	- ()
POSSIBLE COMPLICATIONS:	EXTRACTIONS
Sensitive teeth	BENEFITS:
Feeling of spaces between teeth	Last resort for non-salvageable tooth
Filling may be loosened (Normal if filling was ready to fallout)	Eliminate pain
Sensitive gums	Remove teeth that are out of position
CONSEQUENCES OF NOT HAVING WORK DONE OF POSTPONING	Eliminate infection
Stains on teeth	POSSIBLE COMPLICATIONS:
Odors	Fractured particles may remain
Gum disease	Irritation to nerves may cause temporary or permanent
Will lose teeth sooner	numbness
ALTERNATIVES:	Part or all of tooth may be lodged in sinus requiring more
None	surgery
LOCAL ANICCTUETICS	Bad infections may take long time to clear up
LOCAL ANESTHETICS	Jaw may be stiff and difficult to open for a time
BENEFITS:	If Jawbone is very weak it may fracture
Avoid pain during treatments and procedures	CONSEQUENCES OF NOT HAVING WORK DONE or POSTPONING:
POSSIBLE COMPLICATIONS:	Spread of infection
Prolonged numbness may extend beyond normal	Swelling
Nerve damage	Pain
Bruising (hematoma)	ALTERNATIVES:
In rare instances possible consequences may include all those	None
applicable	May need bridgework or denture

BENEFITS:

CONSEQUENCES OF NOT HAVING WORK DONE or POSTPONING

Mild to severe pain during and after treatment

Willingness to accept pain during treatment

ALTERNATIVES:

Eliminate decay

Relieve Pain

Save the Tooth

POSSIBLE COMPLICATIONS:

Undiagnosable root fracture means failure and extraction Undiagnosable auxiliary canal means failure and extraction

CONSEQUENCES OF NOT HAVING WORK DONE or POSTPONING:

Extraction of tooth

ALTERNATIVES:

Extraction

Bridgework

BRIDGEWORK

BENEFITS:

Make you look nicer

To replace missing teeth

Missing teeth are not removable

Can improve chewing efficiency

POSSIBLE COMPLICATIONS:

Porcelain portion of bridge may fracture

Bridge may come off and need to be recemented

Tooth may abscess and require further treatment (may not show up until later)

Future decay may require a filling or new bridge

CONSEQUENCES:

Teeth will drift and lean over

May lose back teeth due to shifting

Periodontal problems (Gum disease)

Can reduce chewing efficiency

ALTERNATIVES:

Partial

Temporary partials

No teeth in the spaces

PARTIALS (REMOVABLE BRIDGEWORK)

BENEFITS:

Cost

POSSIBLE COMPLICATIONS:

Can wear on Teeth

Can rock or stress teeth - may loosen own natural teeth

Metal clasps are sometimes visible

Decay can occur under clasps

Usually some amount of movement from the partial

CONSEQUENCES OF NOT HAVING WORK DONE or POSTPONING

Same as under Bridgework

ALTERNATIVES:

Bridgework

Temporary partial

Keep spaces without teeth placement

CROWNS - CAPS

BENEFITS:

Make you look nicer (cosmetic)

To repair a tooth which is badly broken down

To prevent a tooth from fracturing

To restore a tooth which has broken

To eliminate a space where food is being trapped

To hold a false tooth in place as part of a bridge

To make a solid structure to attach a partial denture

To splint loose teeth together to strengthen them

The tooth no longer can be filled

POSSIBLE COMPLICATIONS:

Porcelain portion of crown may fracture

Crown may come off and need to be recemented

Tooth may abscess and require further treatment (may not show up until later)

Future decay may require a filling or new crown

CONSEQUENCES OF NOT HAVING WORK DONE or POSTPONING:

Tooth will probably fracture

Tooth may need to be extracted

May need a root canal in addition to the crown

ALTERNATIVES:

Extraction

Temporary Crown

ROOT CANAL

BENEFITS:

Eliminate decay

Relieve Pain

Save the Tooth

POSSIBLE COMPLICATIONS:

Undiagnosable root fracture means failure and extraction Undiagnosable auxiliary canal means failure and extraction

CONSEQUENCES OF NOT HAVING WORK DONE or POSTPONING:

Extraction of tooth

ALTERNATIVES:

Extraction

Bridgework

BONDING

BENEFITS:

Esthetics - they look really nice

Cover crooked teeth

Close spaces and gaps

Cover discolored teeth

POSSIBLE COMPLICATIONS:

Edges can stain after a time and need to be freshened up (additional fee)

Breakage can occur resulting in need for remake

Difficult to remove

CONSEQUENCES OF NOT HAVING WORK DONE or POSTPONING:

None (other than appearance)

ALTERNATIVES:

Crowns

I have read the above statements and have received a copy of them if requested, and recognize their importance in helping me make decisions. My initials indicate that I have read and understand this consent document. I recognize that failures can occur for all kinds of reasons and that complications can occur during any procedure. I also understand that, where decay has occurred, or a tooth has fractured or abscessed, that these same forces are still working on the tooth even after it has been restored: therefore, decay or fracture can still occur as the restored tooth is no better than what nature has given in the first place. If for any reason a conflict or disagreement should arise I will first present such conflict or disagreement to my attending dentist in order to resolve the problem. If we are unable to agree on a solution, then I agree to take the problem to a reconciliation mediation board and agree to accept their resolution in lieu of pursuing remedies by way of litigation. I also understand that this agreement is binding on my heirs and all other family members. I now give my consent to the attending dentist to render to me the dental treatment that we have agreed is necessary for myself. I also agree to reimburse the attending dentist for all services rendered to me, and I am aware that the payment for these services is due at the time they are rendered.
